TRANSCRIPT: President Bill Clinton visits Katzinger's Deli

Gene's Free Lunch has corned beef, roast beef, Swiss cheese, creamy Cole slaw and Russian dressing on pumpernickel. It's a great sandwich.

The secret service was here en masse. Across the street there were guys with rifles on the roofs across the street. President Clinton walks in the door, everybody gasps, the room was full. He looks up and says, "Wow, what a cool place."

Customers, they shake hands, really, really wonderful. They look up at the menu board just like everybody else does when they walk in the deli and they think about what they're gonna have to eat. The president was first.

Uncle Gene has sort of corralled the president and talked to him about his sandwich that was on the board. The president very nicely nodded his head and then came over to place his order.
